Millersville Landfill and Resource Recovery Facility (open since 1975)

Millersville Landfill

is a carefully designed landfill built to the highest environmental standards to protect air quality, groundwater, and nearby streams.

Rigorous monitoring ensures that the environment is protected.

- The Millersville Facility is located on 567.66 acres
- The only active municipal solid waste landfill owned by Anne Arundel County
- Objective is to preserve the life of this valuable asset as long as possible so that we can continue to serve the needs of our citizens well into the future
- Strategy involves diversifying our disposal options, and increasing our recycling activities

Landfill Gas to Electricity Facility

The LFGE facility was commissioned in June 2012 using grand funding from the Federal Energy Block program from the US Dept. of Energy and funding from the County's Solid Waste Capital Improvement Program.


The Millersville Landfill Energy Recovery Facility uses two Caterpillar generator sets.



The engines generate 3.2 megawatts, which is enough to power 2,000 homes!



Beneficial Use of Landfill Gas



The LFGE facility produces revenue to the County from the sale of electricity to the power grid under an agreement with Baltimore Gas and Electric and PJM Interconnection. Additional revenue is produced by the sale of Renewable Energy Credits (RECs). Yearly revenue varies and is based on the price of electricity and RECs, which vary with market demand.



Recycle More Recycle Here - County Recycling Centers

There are three County Recycling Centers for convenient residential drop-off of recyclable and trash materials that cannot be collected at the curb or for residents who prefer to dispose of items immediately.

- Motor Oil
- Cooking Oil
- Scrap Metal
- Electronics
- Lead-Acid Batteries
- Latex Paint
- Rubble Brick, block, etc.
- Tires (limit 4 per visit)

- Freon Appliances
- Vinyl Siding
- Propane Tanks (20lbs or smaller)
- Food Scraps
- Antifreeze
- Oyster/Clam shells
- Brush/Yard Waste
- And....





Textile Recycling





Residents may drop off textiles for reuse or recycling at any of the Recycling Centers.

Do not place textiles in the yellow curbside containers.

- Bedding
- Belts
- Clothing
- Costumes
- Curtains/Draperies
- Pet beds/clothing
- Purses/bags

- Shoes/Flip Flops/Boots
- Table Linens
- Towels
- Stuffed Animals
- Suits/Neckties
- And more!
- NO PILLOWS

Separate all items into two types:

- Usable clothing
- Worn out items (torn, stained, or unmatched shoes/socks)

Bag the usable items separately from the worn items and place in the appropriately labeled bin. Items must be clean, dry and free of mildew.



Anne Arundel County offers "single-stream" recycling collection to over 165,000 customers. Single-stream means accepted materials can be mixed into the same container(s) for collection and processing.

We offer free containers to our customers in a variety of sizes. There is a limit of one cart per household.

Waste Management Recycle America

Our single-stream recycling is processed by Waste Management Recycle America in Elkridge, MD. WMRA is North America's largest recycler. This facility receives commingled materials and then uses a combination of equipment and manual labor to separate and then bale materials for end-users.





Recycle More Often



PAPER

 boxes (cardboard, cereal, frozen food, shoe, pizza), books, shredded paper (secured in a paper grocery bag), copy paper, junk mail, newspaper & inserts, magazines & catalogs, file folders, envelopes, beverage cartons & boxes, wrapping paper

GLASS

all bottles & jars (any color)

PLASTIC

 bottles, jars, jugs, tubs, trays, cups, plates, utensils, buckets, storage totes, flower pots (no dirt), furniture, trash cans NO Plastic bags, Film, or Wrap. These items can be recycled at our Recycling Centers

METAL

 aluminum foil & foil pans, aluminum cans, tin/steel cans, empty aerosol cans NO scrap metal or large metal items. These items can be recycled at our Recycling Centers

What is "wishcycling"?

Placing non-recyclable items in the cart or container with the *hope* they will be recycled.



Large plastic items, such as children's toys and play set, can be recycled at the curb. Place them next to your yellow curbside recycling container.

Call 410-222-6100 to schedule collection of large metal items such as swing sets, refrigerators, and lawn mowers.

Large trash items, such as sofas, wooden bookshelves, or mattresses and box springs, can be placed next to your trash containers. Limited to 3 items per collection day.

REDUCE then REUSE then
RECYCLE

REDUCE

Stop waste before it starts.

- Make a list and buy only what you need at the store!
- Choose products with minimal disposable packaging. Avoid individually-wrapped items.
- Freeze leftovers and produce if you can't use them before they go bad.
- Before you buy, is it something you could borrow or rent?
- Save paper by opting into electronic billing and notifications.



REUSE

Think before you toss.

- Incorporate your leftovers into your weekly meal plan.
- Opt for reusable items (like bags and bottles) over single-use. Avoid disposables when possible.
- Donate non-perishable food and usable clothing/homegoods to your local food bank or charity.
- Reuse containers for storage and organization.
- Consider repairing broken items rather than throwing them away.

RECYCLE

Make the right choice.

- Purchase products made of material that is accepted in our County Recycling Program.
- Compost your food scraps in the backyard or at our Central Recycling Center (see back of card).
- Recycle More, Recycle Right!

Recycle HERE At Work!

- If your workplace doesn't have a recycling program, ask that one is started.
- Implementing a recycling program at your business can potentially reduce trash collection frequency or decrease dumpster size which could mean savings.
- Send a message to customers and employees that your business cares about the community. No Anne Arundel County business is too big or too small to start recycling!
- Contact the management of the places you work and ask them to start a recycling program.
- Small businesses that produce about as much recyclable material as a household can inquire about the County's Small Business Recycling Program.



Recycle HERE At School!

- Recycling is easy using the provided bins in classrooms and the cafeteria.
- Join your Green Club to help improve the eco-friendliness of your school. If there is no Green Club, you can always start one!
- Make posters to remind fellow students what should go in the recycling bin.
- Program Specialists are available for school presentations, tours of our County Landfill, technical assistance for improving recycling at your school, and help with MAEOE certification.



Recycle HERE In Your Community!

- We offer recycling presentations for schools, community associations, youth organizations or home owner/association meetings.
- Become a Community Captain, a community liaison between WMS and your neighborhood or community organization.

• Work with community organizers to ensure public spaces and parks or recreational areas

not managed by the County offer recycling.



Recycle More On-the-Go!

- Use recycling containers at malls, athletic fields, outdoor events and other places, even it if means a few extra steps.
- Remember, recycling opportunities at these locations may be a little different, so look for recycling containers of any color or design, and pay attention to signage and labels.
- If no recycling is available, bring your recyclables home with you.
- Contact the management of the places you visit and ask them to start a recycling program if one isn't already in place.
